



## CHILD ON CHILD ABUSE / SEXUAL AGGRESSION AND VIOLENCE

### LESSON OVERVIEW SHEET

<b>NAME OF FILM:</b>	<b>CUPIDS NIGHT</b>
<b>RUNNING TIME:</b>	<b>12.27 mins</b>
<b>KEY TOPIC AREAS:</b>	<b>How Peer Pressure, Alcohol and Misunderstanding can influence Risk Taking Behaviour and Consent</b>
<b>CHARACTERS:</b>	<b>Jessie –</b> <b>Daniel – victim of peer pressure and likes Jessie</b> <b>Faye – Jessie’s friend and Luke’s girlfriend</b> <b>Luke – Daniel’s friend and Faye’s boyfriend</b> <b>Tom – Daniel and Luke’s friend</b>
<p>The film is set at a house party where alcohol is readily available to all. The story follows five friends who have intertwined relationships and shows the audience how peer pressure can often be misunderstood, and communication incorrectly interpreted, especially where young people are under the influence of either alcohol or drugs. The question of Consent can also be considered within the content of the film</p>	
<b>QUESTIONS / ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION AND DISCUSSION</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Peer pressure – where is this displayed and how does it relate to peer-on-peer abuse (physical v emotional)?</li> <li>• Who do you think is responsible for exploiting Jessie – Daniel? Faye? Luke? Everyone?</li> <li>• What about Jessie’s behaviour towards Tom (touching his bum?) Is this acceptable or not – discuss thoughts and feelings. Is Tom right when he says it would be viewed differently if he did it to Jessie?</li> <li>• Trafficking – you may well wish to refer to this as Jessie is moved from room to room</li> <li>• Does use of social media and texting impact on how messages are interpreted – discuss</li> <li>• CONSENT – could anyone at the party have given consent to any sexual acts</li> </ul>
